Welcome to Tarvin Parish Council's Annual Report for 2015/16. The following pages contain details of the Council's activities throughout the year, financial statements, other relevant Council information, and reports from the main local organisations who received grants from the Council during the year.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

(by the Chairman of the Parish Council, Councillor Ted Lush)

1. The importance of the public

The views, concerns and aspirations of the public are at the very heart of what the Parish Council does.

It is for this reason that every Parish Council meeting starts with an Open Forum where members of the public can raise any issue. The Council has always dealt with the matters raised, although not necessarily at the same meeting. However, following complaints, the Council has tried to make the Open Forum more interactive, so that initial feedback can be given during the Open Forum even if the issue raised is not on the agenda.

Issues raised by the public are most often about environmental matters e.g. litter, overgrown hedges, trees, although transport issues such as speeding and parking also come up often.

It is a sad fact that not many residents attend Council meetings, although the Council tries to overcome this by communicating through Tarvin Times, Tarvinonline, the Council's own website and village noticeboards.

2. Parish Council

There could have been a Parish Council election in May 2015 but as there were fewer than 11 nominations local residents were not required to vote. This was frustrating for the Council, both because it is important to have a full complement of councillors to represent residents, and because of a budget change imposed by Cheshire West and Chester Council (CWaC) which meant the Council had to budget for the cost of an election. The Council spent the year seeking to co-opt new members and this resulted in new Councillors Ford, Holmes, Lloyd, and Ryan. Sadly, two long-serving members, Councillors Spruce and Williams, stood down during the year, and we wish them well. The year ended with one seat still vacant.

3. What we did

On 1st April 2015 the parish was greatly increased in area when the civil parishes of Bruen Stapleford, Hockenhull and Prior's Heys became part of the new Tarvin Parish Council. This had little impact on the population of the parish, which remains at a little over 2,900.

- There were no major planning applications but in June the Council was consulted by a firm of developers (Gladman), working on behalf of the owners of Church Farm, about a proposal for over 200 houses on land to the east of Church Street/Tarporley Road. In response to this outline proposal the Council:
 - noted that the CWaC Local Plan, which covers the period 2010-2030, has designated Tarvin as a Key Service Centre and set a minimum number of 200 new homes to be built, but that this target was close to being already met;
 - said that although there were reasons why the Council might consider it appropriate to have additional housing, e.g.
 - an unmet need for certain types of housing

- to support and improve the range of local businesses and services
- to attract additional community facilities
- it was important that the basic infrastructure could support any development.

The Council also had specific concerns about the proposal, in particular about the amount of land included in the proposed development. The Council was also aware that CWaC owns land adjacent to the site, which had been identified in CWaC's Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessments for possible future housing. The Council felt that it would be better for the community if the whole area, also including land owned by the Diocese, was looked at through one comprehensive master plan. Gladman did listen to the Council and did try to engage with CWaC and the Diocese but unfortunately neither party was interested. A more modest proposal for 65 homes on part of Church Farm's land was put forward in March 2016 and will be the subject of community consultation in May 2016. The revised proposal incorporates many of the suggestions made by the Council.

The most significant cause of concern in the community during the year was the proposal by IGas to carry out seismic surveys to investigate the sub-surface rock layers, to see if the geology might be suitable for future shale gas extraction using the fracking process. The Council was successful in getting representatives of IGas and their survey contractor to a meeting at which there was a lively question and answer session with members of the public. Although survey work was carried out in the parish area the Council does not know what the results were, or whether it will result in a planning application for permission to frack.

The Council continues to be frustrated with the service it receives from CWaC. Improvements have been promised but remain undelivered e.g. the right turn into Tarvin from the A51, which is dangerous as it stands; work is left unfinished e.g. marking out the bus stops; agreed changes take a long time to be implemented e.g. new speed limits in Oscroft and tourist signs on the A51 and A54. To help overcome these deficiencies, the Council agreed in January 2016 to create a new budget which could be used to address this kind of issue.

The Council lobbied the new Labour-controlled CWaC Council not to implement the former administration's school transport policy, which will cost Tarvin parents money, but it did not succeed. The Council also tried and failed to persuade CWaC to continue to pay the previously promised New Homes Bonus money to parish councils. The Council felt and continues to feel that if additional homes are built in its area it should be given additional resources to allow it to provide and improve community facilities. The Council responded to two CWaC consultations one on recreation provision and one on library staffing. In the case of recreation the Council believes that there should be more recreation provision to meet the needs of the parish and in the case of libraries its clear view was that staff should be professional and not volunteers. The Council takes its role as advocate for Tarvin very seriously and will always try to get the best deal for the community.

The Council undertook a public consultation with households on By Pass Road and Millside Close. The concern was the speed of traffic on the A54 and whether that posed difficulties for residents trying to access the centre of the village. Over 60% of households responded and once the analysed the Council felt that a powerful case could be made to CWaC to reduce the speed limit and improve the refuges in the middle of the road. The Council does not know what the response of CWaC will be to this report but it has been written by a local resident, a professional transport planner, so it is in a form that those assessing the case will readily appreciate.

The Council is proud to fund, through modest grants, organisations that through their activities improve the lives of individuals and makes the community a much better place to live. In 2015/16 those groups were the Woodland Trust, the Community Centre, the Scouts, the summer Fete, and the Christmas Festival.

Finally I would like to thank all those individuals who give up their time to make Tarvin a better place, their efforts show and are appreciated. I would also like to officially thank Broomheath Plantation who have provided the Council, over the last two years, with free Christmas trees.

Notes

1. Balances brought forward means Cash in the Bank Accounts.
2. Precept is the money the Parish Council receives from the Council Tax to carry out its duties.
3. Other Receipts covers all other income received by the Council. It comprises of the New Homes Bonus £21,033, Council Tax Reduction Scheme Grant £1,305, Bank Interest £38, VAT refunded by H M Customs and Excise £1,833, Churchyard Grant £685, and a donation of £237.
4. Staff Costs are the payroll costs of the two employees of the Council. Employees received a 1% increase during the year. (NB The Councillors are all volunteers and do not receive payment for their work)
5. Other Payments cover all other expenditure incurred by the Council. This includes the net cost of maintaining the King George V Playing Field, grass cutting, street lighting, Christmas lights, insurance, hire of rooms for meetings, training, printing, and grants given to local organisations.
6. Balances carried forward means cash in the bank accounts. Parish Council Policy is to aim to hold between a minimum of three and a maximum of six months of the most recent precept plus an estimate of any known likely fluctuations. The restricted funds held in the bank account are not part of reserves. Of the £71,092 in the accounts at 31st March 2016 £14,160 is for New Play Equipment, £5,762 is restricted for youth work, £29,491 is the New Homes Bonus, £1,350 covers a grant received and awaiting an invoice for payment, and an amount of £4,975 is restricted. The most recent precept amounted to £38,920. Council consider that general reserves of £15,354 are adequate and acceptable at the present time and in line with the approved policy.

Newsletter

Our newsletter (Tarvin Times) is published four times a year – each February, May, August, and October. All Parish organisations are welcome to contribute to it. Contributions should be forwarded to the Clerk.

Parish Council Meetings

- All Parish Council meetings are open meetings and members of the public are most welcome to attend and listen to the debates.
- If you want to come along to a meeting but don't want to stay until the end that is not a problem. Come and join us and then leave when you wish to do so. All we ask is that you come and go quietly.
- Meetings are normally held on the 4th Monday evening each month in the Edna Rose Room in the Community Centre.
- The first 15 minutes of each meeting is a public forum where anyone can have his or her say on any local matter. The allocated time may be increased under certain circumstances
- An agenda for each meeting is placed on the Council's website and also on the noticeboards by the Red Lion in Tarvin and by the Village Green in Oscroft.
- Informal notes of meetings are normally placed on the noticeboard by the Red Lion in Tarvin within seven days of the meeting being held
- The most recent set of approved minutes are placed on the noticeboard in the Community Centre
- All approved minutes can be found on the Parish Council website

Websites

The Tarvinonline website was launched by the local community on 25th June 2013 and has proved very popular. The website includes daily news, a directory of over 100 Tarvin Businesses, Clubs and Services, an up-to-date calendar showcasing what is on and when, Gallery of photographs, Buy and Sell, Sudoku, and much more.

In August 2013 the Parish Council accepted an offer from Tarvinonline to run a parallel, but independent site within the structure of Tarvinonline. The old Parish Council website was shut down and the new one is operational. There are two ways to reach the new site, either via the Tarvinonline site or via the usual address (www.tarvinparishcouncil.org.uk)

KING GEORGE V PLAYING FIELD COMMITTEE REPORT

(by the Chairman of the Management Committee Councillor Pet Twigg)

The Committee met quarterly, working together, to oversee the management and maintenance of the playing field and its users.

The playing field, bowling and tennis club facilities – together with the play area continue to be well used by residents and visitors of the Parish alike.

Repairs and maintenance to the play area equipment are ongoing and this year has included a full hot wash to the play equipment and surfaces. The hedges have been cut.

Tarvin AFC would like to thank the Parish Council for allowing them to use the King George V Playing Field during the 2015 /16 season. Tarvin Under 11's have used the field on Saturday mornings, and the Under 12's have used it on Sundays throughout the season, and the pitch has been playable most weekends, even when other teams have had their matches cancelled. On a couple of occasions, older age groups have used the field on a Sunday, when asked to reverse the fixture by the opposition, due to unplayable pitches. In addition to this, the youngest age groups at Tarvin (Under 5 and Under 6's) have been training on the field most Sunday mornings. It has been a successful season for Tarvin as a club, with numbers increasing again. Tarvin under 9's and under 11's have reached the Chester League finals, with other teams reaching semi-finals. The Under 12 Blues look in prime position to win their division, and get promoted to the top league. We have started up a girls' team in the last few weeks, with the target of joining a league next season (they are also using Tarvin Playing Fields for training). The aim for next season will be to continue to allow local children to benefit from playing sport in a controlled, safe and organised setting.

Tarvin Tennis Club's major pre-occupation in 2015 was obtaining planning permission for both its new clubhouse and the installation of floodlights on two of the courts. The Club expects the project to be completed by the summer of 2016. The Club held another 'Play Tennis for Free' day in May 2015 promoted by British Tennis and had more than 60 people attending, including many juniors. It is hoped that the improved Club facilities will lead to an enhanced and expanded junior coaching programme and the ambition is to offer playing facilities which match any in the area.

Tarvin Bowling Club has had a good year and has a team in the Chester and District Bowling League playing on Monday and Thursday evenings. Also a team in the

Norley and District Bowling League, playing on a Tuesday afternoon - with two teams playing in the Evening League on a Wednesday. In addition members play social bowls nearly every day of the week and members of the public are welcome to come and watch at any time. Anyone interested in learning or playing are very welcome to pop in and have a go.

On the back of the new Tennis Club development, the bowling club now have new fencing, pavilion and green keepers hut. Over the winter the club has improved the structure of the green to help with the drainage and also reseeded and fertilised it. The playing surface is excellent and is receiving compliments not only from the members but also the visiting teams.

Altogether another enjoyable year for users of the King George V Playing field, residents are reminded that the field is enjoyed by many and we can all play our part to keep it in order - if you see litter please don't walk by, bin it and if you see damage please report it immediately to the Clerk. All matters of antisocial behaviour should be reported to the police (101 if a non-emergency, 999 if an emergency). Dogs must not be let off their lead and dog fouling is an offence and threatens public health, bag it.

TARVIN COMMUNITY WOODLAND TRUST

Tarvin Community Woodland Trust (TCWT) with its new constitution as a company limited by guarantee ensures greater long term security of ownership of the woodland on behalf of the community and less exposure to personal risk for present and future directors/trustees; it is a registered charity like the Trust before it. For details please see our report of last year.

The transition we have undertaken will be completed within a few weeks as we conclude the transfer of ownership of the new Taylor Wimpey section of woodland to TCWT. The full woodland walk will then be some 2 km in length making the round trip good exercise! We continue to monitor other developments in the village in the hope of extending the woodland even further in the future to develop a real wildlife corridor.

Woodlands are best worked in the autumn and winter months, certainly before the birds start to nest. This winter we have achieved much in woodland terms:

- Tree felling and coppicing has opened up the woodland for improved undergrowth development plus stimulation of ground flora. Some of the coppicing has helped a number of our neighbours benefit from increased light and doubtless the demand for more will continue; we sometimes feel if we satisfied all demands for tree reduction there would be little woodland left! So we will progress steadily to allow trees to recover and grow back albeit at lower heights.
- Partly for insurance purposes we commissioned a full professional tree survey and have followed up all of the recommendations including tree and branch removal and have incorporated specific regular tree inspections into our quarterly health and safety checks.
- This year we have had more time to spend on encouraging ground flora to spread with quite considerable success especially with snowdrops, wood anemones, cowslips and blue bells – plus rogue daffodils and crocuses.
- Finally we have generated mountains of “brash” which will be reduced/chipped when the ground is drier and we can be sure not to damage wildlife habitats.

Manpower, as a voluntary organisation, is our lifeblood. The TCWT Board/Trustees has the skills and experience required but we have to look at succession management as we are quite “long in the tooth” if fighting fit! Our thirty or so members, many of whom are also volunteers, are on average a bit younger. They look after the interests of the community and hopefully some will be willing to progress to become trustees. We actively seek further volunteers in two ways; those able to join the existing team particularly as we are growing the scale of the woodland. In fact with Taylor Wimpey’s agreement we are already working on the ground in the new woodland area. However, we also seek inputs from those with more specialist skills in natural sciences, especially botany. Again please see the current newsletter.

At the present most of our woodland work takes place on Thursday mornings when we regularly have eight or more volunteers. In order to attract younger interest we, in addition, are considering some form of weekend work probably project based rather than longer term regular commitment. Grass cutting and construction of the water scrapes are two current examples. Please see the current newsletter for more details which should have been delivered to your door. Do please respond.

Business/finance are areas where we feel we have a good skill mix in the Trust but we again look to the future for new recruits. We receive regular financial support from the Parish Council, community members at our plant sale and coffee morning as well as occasional grants. Also financial donations attract tax advantages. We are fortunate in having adequate funding flows for our needs in the foreseeable future for running costs, equipment replacement and more modest development projects. For larger projects such as land purchase we would seek grant or other funding.

Finally, we thank the Parish Council for its support and through it the Community for their generosity.

TARVIN EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

(by the Parish Council representative Councillor David H Cotgreave)

The Tarvin Educational Foundation manages the endowments of the Tarvin Grammar School and is able to make grants towards secondary and further education to students residing in the Ancient Parish of Tarvin.

During the past 12 months awards have been agreed to 28 students to a total of £10,050. Most of the grants were awarded to undergraduate students on University courses. Another award was given to a ballet student to assist her travel to a top Ballet Company in the North of England, also a young flautist was assisted towards the cost of a new flute. Other grants were agreed towards educational project trips abroad.

Assistance may also be given to young person’s training for a profession or trade such as an apprenticeship.

TARVIN COMMUNITY CENTRE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The year has shown significant progress towards the goals of the Committee. Works have been undertaken to improve the appearance and usability of the Centre. The Committee members have redecorated the Edna Rose Room, Foyer and Small Room. The Edna Rose Room has been refurbished with new blackout curtains, round tables and new tablecloths: these improvements were substantially funded through a grant from the Cheshire Community Foundation. It became apparent after these improvements that the Kitchen needed some major works. A scheme was prepared and a local contractor was appointed to carry out the works. This work was financed from the Community Centre's own reserves together with a grant from the local Borough Councillors for a Dishwasher, plus other donations from some of the Centre's users towards the Hot water Boiler. These improvements have significantly enhanced the appeal of the Centre not only for our regular users but also our occasional hirers.

A new Logo has been designed and adopted by the Committee.

The usage of the Small Room has increased over the period with new users being attracted to the facilities offered.

Changes by Cheshire West and Chester Council to the management of the maintenance and cleaning of CWaC owned premises has caused considerable concern over the past 6 months with redundancies and changes to working hours being proposed, rescinded and then reintroduced. Fortunately for the Committee the Lease with CWaC specifies that the services of a Caretaker are to be provided. Our Caretaker Rob Delemere was offered and took voluntary early redundancy. A new Caretaker has now been appointed (Ian Baker) his appointment is working reasonably well despite him having to undertake additional duties away from Tarvin. As a side issue the changes have resulted in the Committee having to provide all kitchen and toilet requisites, this amounted to £475 during the year.

The financial stringency being suffered by CWaC has manifested itself in the lack of improvements being undertaken within the building and the extended time in receiving responses to enquiries.

The immediate future is particularly exciting as the development of the New Lounge Area is now at an advanced stage. We have obtained landlord's permission for the works from CWaC and Building Regulation permission, Grant Funding of £50,000 from WREN, together with smaller grants of £7500 from the Garfield Weston Foundation and £5000 from the Williams Family Foundation these together with funding from the Community Centre's own reserves, means that we have been able to accept a tender from Novus Property Solutions for the works to commence. It is hoped that the work will be completed over the summer period and be available for all by the beginning of September

I am delighted to report that the overall financial position of the Community Centre remains healthy with an increase in letting income of 12% with events income increasing by a magnificent 69% over the previous year. The overall surplus for the year was almost £23,000. The Committee aims to hold a contingency reserve equal to one quarter's running costs (approximately £7,000) and the balance of its reserves are being set aside to help finance the new lounge area and future developments. The Grant from the Parish Council, a most welcome £1,000 enabled the Committee to underwrite the cost of fulfilling its aim of providing live theatre performances at affordable prices including taking risks on some of the more unusual events. This

again has proved very successful with both young and old enjoying live performances. The monthly film nights continue to be successful with good audiences (dependent on the film) being achieved.

The Community Centre has been improved and will continue to be improved. It now offers facilities for all and must remain the heart of the village. This has not been achieved easily and the current Committee have worked tirelessly to achieving what we have today. I thank them for their efforts and the many hours of work undertaken behind the scenes. My own involvement has been able to be reduced somewhat by some of the Committee members taking over the responsibility for certain users.

This needs to be taken further, as by the recruitment of new members to the Committee we hope to achieve further delegation of responsibilities, reducing the current workload of individual members and thereby gaining a happier less stressed Committee. At present there are over 40 different users of the Centre all having their own individual requirements?

The Tarvin Community Centre Committee of Management is an enthusiastic group of people they may sometimes become very frustrated but have a clear vision for the future and welcome the support they receive from the Parish Council. With its ongoing support and that of the community they will continue to work together to achieve their goal of making Tarvin a great place to live.

Background Information

The website was created in June 2013 as a direct response to the communication need identified in Tarvin Parish Plan using a grant from the Big Lottery Fund. Based largely on the early success of the website we were successful in securing a second grant to develop the website further and provide for hosting costs in the near future.

A few facts and figures

The website has published 2,030 articles since its launch and has been visited 194,000 times with over 385,000 web pages being viewed. There is a positive trend in readership with monthly average access now exceeding 7,300. Emails are the main source of contact by readers and 2,700 have been received to date.

Communication links

Facebook has become an integral part of modern communication. Our latest weekly statistics show that total reach is between 1,500 and 2,000. Abstracts from all articles go to our Facebook page and provide links to the article on the website if people want to read more. We also provide a Twitter feed. We have just had new software installed in the website (paid for by the 2nd Big Lottery grant) which dynamically adjusts the page layout to match the size of viewing screen whether PC/laptop, tablet or smart-phone. We recently made a parish -wide distribution of a leaflet promoting the website and encouraging residents to get involved. A Tarvinonline "Pop-up" banner is used at major events to remind residents of the website.

What does the website offer?

The team has built up extensive directories of local Businesses (72) and Societies (33) providing outline information, contacts and links to other village websites. This is invaluable both for existing residents and newcomers to the community. A Calendar gives details of forthcoming events up to a year ahead which helps to avoid

overlapping events. Over 2,400 images are stored relating to articles as well as views around Tarvin.

Our target is 2 articles each day. Some highlight forthcoming events or report events that have taken place. Wherever possible we encourage those running the event to supply the article in full but the editorial team will always "flesh out" articles based on outline information. Images, depicting the village or people involved are used wherever possible. Major parish events such as the annual Village Fete, Christmas Market or the Village Quiz are promoted through several articles leading up to the event to encourage active participation. Occasionally the website acts as a focus for local "campaigns" e.g. traffic issues, school transport, broadband rollout. Due to the daily involvement by the editorial team the website is always up to date and can often post "real-time" information e.g. traffic accidents. We have built up a number of regular contributors from several Village Societies and Organisations.

The website policy is to archive all past articles as a record of parish life and a powerful search facility allows the user to sift through and find their topic of interest.
